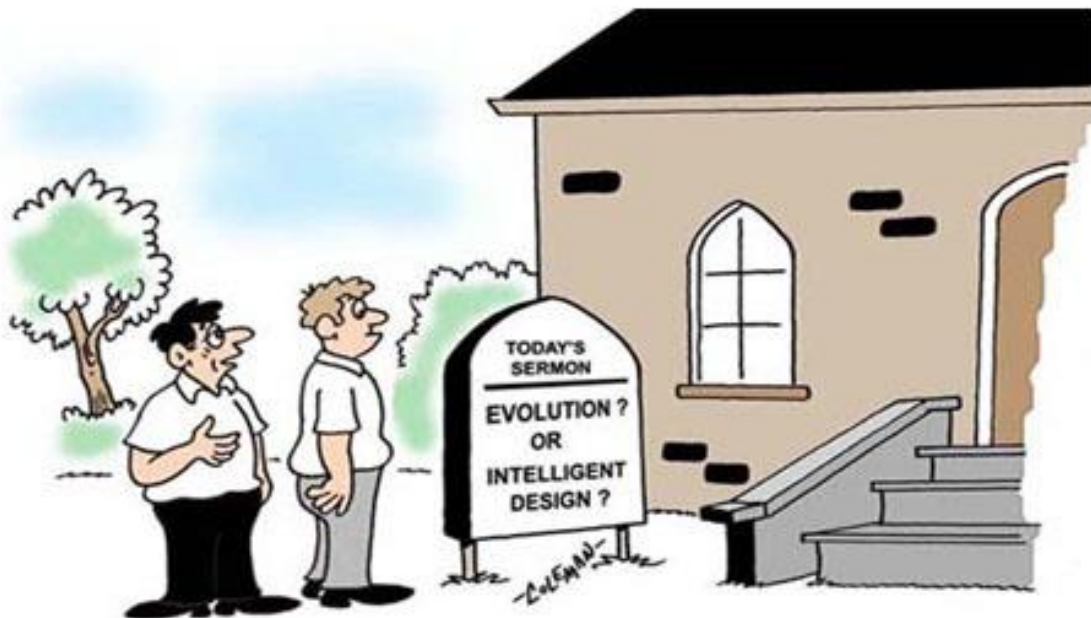

Can't be published elsewhere or even in social media before publication. Doesn't appear in print, web only. Submissions are due by Tuesday, Wednesday's look day. Air Mail is published weekly. Air Mail/CartoonStock sends out a mass email on Friday (sometimes a little later) that they are done reviewing cartoons that were submitted on Tuesday. They would reach out to you individually if you sold anything.

Warning: This website appears to be out of business and being utilized by hackers for some type of scam. I suggest cartoonists avoid uploading to this site. I did ask the Chat GPT program for any information they have on it, and here is what they gave me:

It seems that Artizans.com, once a reputable platform for cartoonists to upload and sell their work, has encountered significant issues in recent years. Several cartoonists have reported that the site no longer responds to inquiries or pays artists for sales. Cartoon Merchandise

Cartoonstock

I don't know if you all have noticed but besides licensing cartoons for cartoonists they represent, Cartoonstock also offers gift items for sale such as t-shirts, coffee mugs, framed prints and more decorated with these cartoons.

There is no mention about if they pay a commission on these sales, so I asked them. Here is what Joel Mishon responded: "Of course cartoonists get paid when their images are used on merchandise items. They receive 50 percent of profit after costs – so if your image is used on a product, such as a t-shirt, you will receive 50% of the remaining profit after the cost of producing the item is deducted. This means we first subtract the production costs of the t-shirt and any printing cost, and then your share will be 50% of the remaining amount. "

News

I recently wrote to the editors of *Private Eye* magazine about a concern I have about several publications who specify they don't want cartoonists submitting to other publications until they have reviewed the cartoons, yet on the other hand they don't respond to submissions, so cartoonist don't know if they have been rejected or not. I pointed out that on one occasion I had an editor get back to me with a rejection after eight years of holding my work. I got the following response from *Private Eye*, which I think is a very reasonable answer:

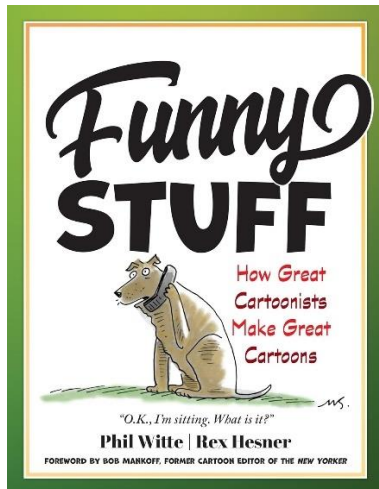
"Ed Clarke here. I look after the cartoons for the Editor as well as being a designer on the team who put the magazine together. Thanks for your email. As you say, many publications don't get back to cartoonists at all. We, on the other hand (as explained in the automatic reply that all submitters receive) tell cartoonists definitively whether we are using their cartoon or would like to hold onto it by the Tuesday that we go to press. It's a system we developed after a lot of thought and conversation with a number of cartoonists as well as senior members of the PCO who have been very positive about it – particularly because it gives cartoonists plenty of time to get their unchosen submissions to the *Spectator*, the *Oldie*, the *New Yorker*, etc.

I think you will struggle to find a more efficient way to keep upwards of 200 cartoonists (many of whom send multiple submissions a fortnight) up to date with what we are using. But if you know of one then we would love to hear about it – there is obviously always room for improvement in any system.

All we ask is that we are not put into a situation where we are embarrassed by seeing the same cartoon that we have chosen to run also featured in a different publication. We are a fortnightly publication and an exclusively print one at that. We need to be sure that the magazine that will sit on newsstands for the next fourteen days is not carrying duplicate material. Again, if you can think of a method of doing this that doesn't involve asking that the ideas that you submit to us are exclusive to us initially, we would love to hear it. Unfortunately, from experience we have discovered that nothing else has worked thus far...

Thanks for taking the time to write to us about this. I hope the above helps to explain why we ask what we ask for.
